Presidents' Message

Dear Friends,

March is designated as Women's History month. There are many, many women that have furthered social progress, made scientific breakthroughs, and championed medical causes. You only hear about them in March.

So, this March I (Heather) would like to highlight a lesser-known suffragist, feminist, antimilitarist, and founder of the ACLU – Crystal Eastman.

Crystal Eastman was very well known in her time, but much of her history has faded away. She was born in Marlborough, MA to two Congregational Ministers. Her mother, Annis Bertha Ford, was one of the first women in the US



"What, then, is "the matter with women"? What is the problem of women's freedom? It seems to me to be this: how to arrange the world so that women can be human beings, with a chance to exercise their infinitely varied gifts in infinitely varied ways, instead of being destined by the accident of their sex to one field of activity -housework and childraising. And second, if and when they choose housework and child-raising, to have that occupation recognized by the world as work, requiring a definite economic reward and not merely entitling the performer to be dependent on some man."

ordained as a Protestant minister. The family moved to Elmira where her parents were the pastors of the Church of Thomas K. Beecher. Mark Twain's family were also members of the congregation. I feel a particular affinity for Elmira as my mother's family is from there.

Eastman earned a bachelor's degree from Vassar College in 1903, a master's in sociology from Columbia University in 1904, and a law degree in 1907 from New York University.

As a lawyer, she worked for workers' rights, especially in terms of workplace accidents. After co-founding the American Union Against Militarism, she formed the National Civil Liberties Bureau within the Union. That division eventually became the ACLU.

A prolific author of many articles and books, she ran a socialist magazine with her brother Max called *The Liberator*. The periodical published essays, art, fiction, and poems by many prominent writers and other creatives including Ernest Hemingway and Helen Keller. It also fought against propaganda and was seen as a threat to national security by the US government.

Eastman was an active suffragist and joined Alice Paul and Lucy Burns to found the Congressional Union (National Woman's Party) to work towards an amendment to the Constitution rather than a state-by-state movement. She is most well known for her speech "Now We Can Begin," given after the amendment was won for Women's Suffrage. She saw Suffrage as not the end but the beginning of the fight for women's rights. She urged Suffragists to fight for equal rights for women.

NOTICE OF BY-LAWS CHANGE TO BE APPROVED BY MEMBERSHIP

The following change to our branch By-laws was approved by the board members on February 24. Any change to the By-laws must first be approved by the board and then be sent to all members at least ten days prior to a membership vote on the proposed change. That vote on this proposed change will be taken at the March branch meeting scheduled for March 12 from 4 P.M. to 6 P.M., at Brookdale. All members present will be able to vote on an individual ballot as they check in for the meeting.

We will schedule a Zoom meeting with the Copresidents prior to that date for any members

who have questions about the change, and the link for that meeting will be sent to all members.

The motion for the change that follows was made by **Nancy Butler**, seconded by **Susan Gelber**, and passed by a unanimous vote of the board members present at the February board meeting. The motion changes the date of the Annual Meeting from the April branch meeting to a designated meeting between April 1 and May 31 of any calendar year.

The change is to By-laws Article XVII Meetings of the Membership
Section 2. Annual Meeting. One general
membership meeting held between April 1 and
May 31 shall be designated the Annual
Meeting with the exact date, time, and place to
be determined by the board.

The rationale for this change is that often the annual Scholarship Luncheon is in April and there may be no April Branch meeting. It also provides additional time for the Nominations Committee to complete its work and notify branch members.

We hope to see you at the March meeting and ask you to please take the time to vote.

EDUCATION OUTREACH

by Connie Goddard Resilience and Tenacity Characterize Brookdale Scholarship Winners

Last fall, the Education Outreach Committee, working with Brookdale officials, substantially altered the way our scholarship awards are given to students there. The result has been gratifying. Now, students apply for the awards, which are worth \$2000 each and can be used for any purpose that aids the student in meeting her educational goals.

The office of the Brookdale College Foundation selects the winners, and we are so pleased that they exemplify the rationale behind the awards. One winner noted that the past year had, for her, been one of hardship and loss, so "resilience" became her "guiding word for 2024." And, as 2025 began, she said it was to be a "year of tenacity."

The three awards are named after three long-term AAUW-NMCB members. All three were involved with education: Audrie LaTowsky and Louise Marsen at Brookdale (LaTowsky as a trustee and Marsen as a librarian); Ruth Kennedy at schools in New Jersey and abroad.

Two of the winners noted that family medical issues have determined their career paths. One cared for her father as he died of cancer; thus, she decided to leave a job in the financial industry and pursue a BSN specializing in oncology. Another is the mother of a nonverbal child who has been diagnosed with autism. Her goal is to complete a master's degree in social work through a partnership program between Brookdale and Rutgers, and then to establish a therapeutic facility for children with neurological differences. Another winner aims to be a nurse midwife because of her concern for the "alarming disparities in maternal mortality" that adversely affect Black women.

One of the winners noted that she is the child of immigrant parents who "worked tirelessly" to support her earlier education. Like the other two, she is a parent herself, and "despite the challenges of balancing school and family life," she looks forward to having her children see her "achieve her dream."

In addition to noting how these scholarships have relieved them of financial stress, the winners for this year said they were dedicated to giving back to the communities that have supported them. One wrote that she has been volunteering with Lunch Break. (Note that comments in quotation marks above are from the students' applications and letters of appreciation.)

All three have also sent thank you notes, which I've circulated to members of the Education Outreach Committee, so we thank them for expressing their gratitude. Otherwise, Brookdale has requested that we not publish their names. But do join us in wishing them well as they pursue their dreams.

Hymer Scholarship Winners Exemplify Her Priorities

Awardees of the Esther Hymer Scholarship at Monmouth University represent a substantial complement to the career of Esther Hymer, for whom the award is named. An early supporter of the United Nations and an active member of AAUW-NMCB for many years, Esther dedicated herself to advocating for women's equality around the world.

Both Michelle Rymar and Mariami Ramirez, who were each awarded \$1000 from the Hymer scholarship this year, are majoring in political science with an interest in international relations.

Michelle, whose parents immigrated from Ukraine, stated that she became interested in politics during 2020, a "volatile election year," while she was still in high school. Once at Monmouth, she became involved with the Model United Nations debate team, an experience she says has been valuable for research she intends to pursue. Of particular interest to her is voter behavior at the local level, the effect of education on turnout, and the evolution of executive power. Currently, Michelle is weighing options for her future: graduate school to become a professor or law school, including an option for studying abroad.

As an immigrant from the country of Georgia at age 11, Mariami has direct experience living under another political system. A member of the Long Branch High School debate team, she has continued that interest at Monmouth. Through it, she traveled to Kolkata in India last year, where she worked with a program that helps orphaned children get a high-quality education. She mentored students in a debate about gender equality in India. At Monmouth, she is active with Students Advocating for Girls

Education. Her career plans are now focused on international law and politics in Eastern Europe. Among her goals is continuing to bring students of different races, genders, and nationalities together, an effort she has undertaken while at Monmouth.

AAUW acts on a range of issues that align with our Public Policy Priorities through engaging our action network, advocating through social media, and signing coalition letters. In the first few weeks of the 119th Congress, we have endorsed letters on protecting Title IX and education equity (opposing Linda McMahon's nomination as U.S. Secretary of Education), civil rights (opposing H.R.28 and EO 14166), economic security (supporting the Job Protection Act), and reproductive rights. 

Secretary of Education Confirmation

AAUW has been forcefully opposing the confirmation of Linda McMahon for U.S. Secretary of Education. An AAUW Press Release on 2/13/25 quotes CEO Gloria Blackwell: "AAUW calls on the Senate to reject McMahon's nomination and demand a leader who will uphold the mission of the Department of Education: to expand opportunity, protect civil rights, and invest in students' success. Insights, our non-fiction book group meets for discussion on the second Tuesday of each month, September through June.


Our upcoming book choices and meetings are as follows:




