Dues notices will be mailed to all members in May, so please do not pay your dues on the National website as this complicates the work for our treasurer.


We will be doing the Shape the Future membership campaign at the Scholarship

AAUW in Action

(from CEO Gloria Blackwell's message in "Mission & Action" email newsletter dated 3/25/25)

"If you have not heard the news, the

administration has just issued an Executive Order to dismantle the U.S. Department of Education. While only Congress has the authority to abolish the Department, this order is the latest in a series of attacks on student rights, educational equity, and civil rights enforcement. Read our statement here.

"Here is what I say to you: AAUW remains committed to defending and promoting the value of higher education, the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion, and upholding our mission to advance equity for women and girls.

"Amid these attacks, AAUW is taking action. We have launched the <u>Defend Higher</u> <u>Education Fund</u> to help elevate the critical higher education issues impacting women. We are holding a series of events on Defending Equity. We are continuing to invest in women through direct funding, leadership development, and support for women in academia.

"Our collective action is needed now more than ever when the consequences are so widespread."

Take Action

- "Stand with Students: Efforts to undermine the U.S. Department of Education including cuts to critical programs like campus-based childcare, financial aid, and the Office for Civil Rights—threaten students' futures. Urge Congress to protect equal access to education. <u>Take action</u> <u>now.</u>"

Insights, our non-fiction book group meets for discussion on the second Tuesday of each month, September through June.


Our upcoming book choices and meetings are as follows:


