Developed by AAUW-NJ this virtual program was attended by a number of members. Walker was an entrepreneur, and political and social activist, and the first female self-made millionaire. We also heard from contemporary women of color entrepreneurs who were inspired by Walker's legacy.

Excellent presentation by Stacy Kallman, from the New Jersey Coalition Against Human Trafficking.

May 6

A presentation that informed members about the National AAUW vote to change membership requirements. (See post-vote letter from National in this *NetWorks*.) The program also included an update on the ERA Campaign, other public policy initiatives, and the local Running & Winning project.

<u>Public Policy</u>: Nancy Butler, Public Policy Director, kept us up to date about AAUW Public Policy efforts and provided encouragement and opportunities for taking action including:

- At branch meetings, she provided updates that members could take
- In NetWorks she provided a column covering a range of topics focusing on:

The ERA, AAUW's support for paid leave for all; voting issues and engagement, Title IX, Paycheck equality and women's health, and tips on how to take action.

Nancy attended the live-streamed AAUW NJ Annual Meeting and Public Policy Committee meetings, webinars provided by National AAUW on issues and the 2024 Vote Campaign launch, and Florida AAUW public policy webinars by former NMCB branch board member **Mary Gatta**.

During the summer, Nancy will be working with a committee to plan an event for students in the WILL program (Women in Learning and Leadership) on voter information and registration for the November election using the resources in the 2024 Voter Engagement Campaign.

Study Group: Susan Gelber maintained an active and good relationship with study groups and their members. She asked them for baskets for the annual scholarship luncheon, which were very well received by attendees. Susan kept the study groups up to date on branch events.

Current groups are Art History, Insights, French Conversation, and Russian Literature. Though there are only these four groups, they have a continuing and active membership. If members are interested in a new study group, they can contact Susan for information on how to get started.

<u>Membership</u>: Membership co-directors Mary Lea Burden and Judy Kramer recruited several new members this year. They maintained connections to new members at meetings, through emails, and phone calls with the goal to keep new members engaged.

Three new members were signed up at the scholarship luncheon through Shape the Future and three memberships were gifted to **Patty Whyte** and **Stephanie Cartier**, our two

Women of Achievement, and the speaker **Elaine O'Brien**.

Mary Lea notes that unfortunately, National has done away with the Give a Grad a Gift program which was a wonderful way to introduce recent college graduates to AAUW.

Current membership stands at 116, this includes 14 Honorary Life, 2 Life, 2 Guests, 3 Dual and 4 C/U representatives. There are three new honorary life members this year who have been paid members for 50 years: Barbara Bassell, **Theo Mulgrum** and **Mary Lea Burden**. This brings our total to 14 Honorary Life Members presently in our branch.

Yearbook: Mary Lea Burden, with a yearbook committee, was able to again produce a printed yearbook which was mailed to each member in early December. An email version was also sent to members who have email. Member updates were also published in each issue of Networks. For those without email NetWorks is mailed via USPS to approximately 12 members monthly.

Communications:

NetWorks: Our amazing newsletter editor and communications director, Karen Topham, produced (including this June edition) eight beautiful and informative NetWorks issues. Each issue is packed with articles from members, information on upcoming events, new members, and beautifully edited photographs that Karen and other members took of meetings and events. Copies are posted online with the references to phone numbers and other personal information removed, and redacted public copies are also available at the used book sale.

Website: The website, run by **Heather Balczarek**, Co-president, provides information on upcoming events, book sale hours, and

public policy, and is a way for new and current members to join by paying online. The scholarship luncheon receives its own page and includes payment information as well.

Facebook: The Facebook page is the dynamic cousin to the website. It changes often with posts from Karen Topham and Nancy Butler on AAUW news as well as NMCB meetings and other AAUW events. They keep the Facebook page up-to-date and timely.

Development:

Annual Scholarship Luncheon:

As the location for last year's luncheon was so well received, the luncheon committee, led by **Kathy Olsen** (also our Member of the Year!) reserved the Beacon Hill Country Club again for April 17, 2024. With PayPal providing an easy way to pay online and paper invitations mailed to all members, there were 89 guests. (Beacon Hill required a minimum of 50 quests for the event). The luncheon takes a committee to pull off - a thank you to Kathy Olsen for chairing this important event for a second year and also a big thank you to committee members: Alice MacPhee, Ruth Hodum, Annette Benanti, MaryLea Burden, Marie Gambuzza, Susan Gelber, Barbara Iwanski, Judy Kramer, Lauren Nicosia, and Janet Richter. Alice MacPhee once again handled a seamless reservation process making arrival and seating easy and Ruth Hodum oversaw donations and prep of 30 amazing gift baskets. Many compliments of the baskets were overheard by us.

The honorees for Women of Achievement were **Stephanie Cartier**, founder of *No Limits Café* and **Patty Whyte**, nurse practitioner, midwife, and volunteer at The Parker Clinic and Red Bank Library.

The speaker this year was **Elaine O'Brien**, author of the book the *Power of Play*, that reminds us to take time for ourselves and add wonder to our lives.

Used Book Sale: The Used Book Sale is chaired by **Kathy Olsen**, **Irene Gibson**, and

Ruth Hodum. Together they manage and run this valuable but challenging resource. The book sale serves as funding for branch scholarships and is also a way to publicize NMCB and our events. It is a link to the community and has recruited a few new members.

The book sale opened the Saturday after Labor Day and will continue until the last Saturday in June. Hours were changed this year to a later opening and closing time, open at 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. to be open when there were more customers. In addition, they now welcome shoppers on Thursdays from 10 a.m. until noon while they are accepting donations, sorting, and shelving books. This seems to be working better for both volunteers and customers. At **Maureen Paoni's** suggestion, a sign outside brings in curious shoppers.

Irene Gibson has taken over the task of recruiting and scheduling Saturday volunteers. They do need more volunteers – please consider spending some of your time at the book sale so this valuable resource is able to continue. Last fall, two students from Brookdale Community College volunteered. On Thursdays, there is a faithful group: Kathy Olsen, Irene Gibson, Ruth Hodum, Barbara Withers, Sonia Dorn, Sherri Rao, and Ellen Jackson Patterson. They also assist with the task of summer sorting and purging.

Education/Outreach:

Scholarships: At the recommendation of Connie Goddard, Education Outreach Director, Marian, Heather, and she met with the Vice President of Advancement at Brookdale, Nancy Kaari, and her confidential assistant, Margaret Agha, to clarify how our Brookdale scholarship recipients are selected. They were very supportive of our goal to see that the most deserving students, who meet our criteria, receive these scholarships. Over the summer we will be reviewing and updating our scholarship requirements where needed.

High School Math Book Awards: Connie Goddard and Judy Kramer worked on organizing the Book Awards with personalized bookplates and certificates provided by Ruth Hodum. A committee of members met at Judy's house to assemble and deliver the 20 book awards. Thanks to Laura Bagwell, Heather Balczarek, Mary Lea Burden, and Peggy James for helping.

The book selected this year was *Hope* by Jane Goodall. The books were again purchased from River Road Books, an independent woman-owned bookstore in Fair Haven.

NCCWSL: The NCCWSL (National Conference of College Women Student Leaders) was an in-person event again for 2024 and we are pleased to report that NMCB will be sending a student from Brookdale Community College to attend this three-day event at the University of Maryland. We hope they can join us for a meeting next year to share their experiences at this event that has been very powerful for students and that NMCB has supported in the past.

Two special projects:

Preserving BCC History - The board was asked if we could provide at least a portion of the funds required to restore and preserve the original taped interview sessions made when our members researched and wrote A Triangle of Land, the original history of Brookdale Community College, for its tenth anniversary celebration (subsequently updated for its 25th anniversary by the college). The tapes were given to BCC by the branch after the original project was completed and some were deteriorating and no longer usable. To preserve the remainder, the college hired a preservation expert and asked the branch to help fund this work. The board agreed and the project has been completed and the tapes should be available for years to come for future historians.

Running & Winning Workshop resumed for the second-year post-Covid and the 15th presentation year since its inception in 2007. Our biggest collaborative project with other organizations, Running & Winning is sponsored by this branch of AAUW, the Monmouth County LWV, the Junior League of Monmouth Co., the Red Bank Chapter of Hadassah, and now for the second year, the Central Jersey Club. Running & Winning 2024 included students from 12 area public high schools and introduced them to women who currently hold elective office and included a presentation to a hypothetical school board that the students prepared in small working groups. This is a non-partisan event designed to encourage young women to vote and to consider running for public office someday. Marian Wattenbarger Co-chaired it and Judy Kramer and Ruth Hodum served on the Steering Committee.

One final thought, while members and mission are at the heart of every organization, without some individuals who are willing to assume leadership positions, organizations cannot survive for long. Please consider becoming a board member or running a meeting or new study group. If you have an idea for a program or a new study group, please let us know. We'd be delighted to hear from you.

We wish to thank all board members and

volunteers who make this branch a success. A special thank you to recording secretary, Sonia **Dorn**, who attends every meeting and submits extensive minutes every month; Treasurer Katharine McCleary, whose report will be submitted at the end of the fiscal year and who has been instrumental in financial recommendations and is knowledgeable about NMCB financial matters; and Marie Gambuzza member at large, who liaises with members and brings concerns to the board. Betsy Wattley, after 14 years, will no longer be our corresponding secretary. Betsy is the one who made sure that all those yearbooks we've found so helpful were mailed to all of us, and she is the one from whom you may have received a get-well, congratulations, or sympathy card on behalf of the branch through the years. We will miss her and thank her for all she has done to keep us connected.

Thank you to **Marion Giles** for conducting our annual audit for the year 2022/2023 this past September. Marion has provided this service for the branch for several years, and we appreciate her expertise and support. We are also glad that Brookdale Community College and Monmouth University are College/University partners of AAUW and appreciate the many ways through the years they have supported our programming and helped us support their students.

This is crunch time! We have been given this year to get the ERA into the Constitution. We need to pull out all the stops for this to take place.

- The ERA has been ratified, and simply needs to be published as the 28th Amendment
- The ERA is a necessary component of the US Constitution to ensure sex discrimination is prohibited in all future cases going before the Supreme Court
- 38 States have ratified the ERA
- 50 years since the ERA was passed by Congress

 3 out of 4 of all adults favor adding the ERA to the Constitution

Diana Boyd – September 13, 1938-March 15, 2024. Diana matriculated to Wheaton College, in Norton, Massachusetts, graduating in 1960. A math major, she was intrigued by the new opportunities offered up in computers, introduced to her by dear friends from Wheaton. Her career as a computer programmer in research at Bell Telephone Laboratories went from punched cards to PCs. She was a pioneer who contributed to both the Multics and Unix operating systems, work which now forms the

basis of the modern Internet. A resident of Rumson, New Jersey for 50 years, Diana made many lifelong friends there. Diana loved to read, watch birds on the Navesink River, and travel, especially to Scotland. Diana was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Rumson till her death. Diana will be remembered for her strong faith and dedication to the Church. As a member of the Historic Committee, she enjoyed helping the church built in 1886 by the famous architect Thomas Hastings obtain National Landmark Status.



Madeline Muise - February 10, 1943-May 5, 2024. Madeline's life was marked by a deep commitment to family and friends, compassion for others amd community. Madeline was always keen for an adventure and was a lifelong learner. Madeline dedicated her lifelong work to helping individuals, couples and families find renewed meaning, purpose amd joy in their lives. Madeline received a Master's degree in social work from Rutgers University and went on to have a long and fulfilling career as a Mediator and Marriage and Family Therapist. Madeline was in private practice at Mediation & Therapy Associates where she was known for her work with families experiencing divorce and was passionate about supporting and empowering families. Madeline never retired, found joy in her work and was happily talking to her clients to the very end.

Community was dear to Madeline; she was a member of AAUW for over fifty years, where she made some of her dearest friends. She joined our branch in 1972 and ran the Juvenile Justice Study Group for several years which led to branch members volunteering to help troubled teens. Madeline and her husband Dick

loved to sail and enjoyed their time engaged in activities at the Shrewsbury River Yacht Club.

Summer STEMEd Program for High School Girls and Caregivers

This free virtual program for high-school girls and their caregivers will take place from June 1 to July 20, and is aimed at encouraging students to pursue studies and careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM).

With a particular focus on girls of color, the sessions seek to pave the way for students' success in college and beyond. Piloted in summer 2021, the program reached over 600 teen girls and 350 caregivers. Click for more information or to register for the program.

On behalf of the AAUW Board of Directors, we are disappointed that the initiative to open AAUW's membership did not pass. We understand that this outcome may feel exclusionary to some. But AAUW's history is one of continual change and growth, even in the face of challenges. That same resilient spirit must guide us now as we seek to fulfill AAUW's purpose to advance equity for women and girls.

There are many ways to engage with AAUW and support our mission beyond membership.
