All of us, as adult citizens of this democracy, have the privilege and obligation to vote in annual elections for local members of school boards and town councils and, over the years, for state and federal office holders. Please also reach out to young people in your lives and encourage them to register to vote and to vote in this election. A great resource for young voters is *Energizing Young Voters*, an initiative from the League of Women Voters available at energizingyoungvoters.com.

Marian got better acquainted with the writing and speeches of Susan B. Anthony when she had the opportunity to write a portion of the script for *Suffragists Speak* in honor of the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in 2020. A few of Anthony's quotes come to mind each year as we approach November and election time. We hope you'll consider these as you prepare to vote:

"There will never be complete equality until women themselves help to make laws and elect lawmakers."

"The principle of self-government cannot

be violated without impunity. The individual's right to it is sacred – regardless of class, caste, race, color, sex or any other accident or incident of birth."

And finally, this brief but pointed statement:

"Men, their rights and nothing more. Women, their rights and nothing less."

You'll find information on voter education in Nancy Butler's message. Nancy is our Public Policy Director and she and other members have been working to prepare us for the year ahead. In Memoriam:

Elaine Lent died on May 21st. She joined our branch in 2003 and presented programs for the branch

From her obituary we learn that Elaine was a beloved mother, teacher, historian, artist, and community supporter. She graduated from Newark State College in Union, N.J. in 1968, and continued her education from Kean College. completing a Master's degree in Industrial Technology in 1987. She was a Classroom Teacher, Gifted and Talented Coordinator for the Basking Ridge Public Schools until her retirement in 2005. Her dedication to teaching led to her Christa McAuliffe Fellowship award in 1988, as well as an Outstanding Teacher award. One of her greatest pleasures was history and the American Revolutionary War. As a member and historian for Old First Church in Middletown. N.J. she received the Middletown Historic Preservation Award in 2017.

Elaine was also a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, N.J. Astronomical Society, Northern Monmouth County Branch of AAUW, N.J. Chapter of People to People International, Middletown Community Outreach Group, Poricy Park Nature Conservatory, Middletown Township Historic Preservation Commission, and Monmouth Beach Cultural Center.

Doris Hudak died on July 11th. She joined our branch in 2003. She also presented branch programs and was Co-President from 2009-2011.

Her obituary shares that after raising four children, Doris went back to school in 1980 to Brookdale Community College to focus her studies in Human Services. Her experience at Brookdale led her to be a grief facilitator and a career counselor, and she eventually received her BS in Human Services from Thomas Edison State University in 1990 at the age of 61. Doris worked at Brookdale as a Cooperative

Education Coordinator, guiding students to find their strengths and interests. She was active with the Alumni Association and later served as President, where she spearheaded multiple fundraising campaigns. She acquired a life-sized statue of the Kentucky Derby winner *Regret*, a racehorse that was trained at Brookdale Farms, the land where the college now resides.

Doris had many hobbies, but most of all she loved to travel. When the Brookdale Asia Society was seeking new students, her interest in China propelled her to join. She became the cymbalist, accompanying performances of the traditional Dragon Dance. She won a gold medal in karate at the age of 68 in France and her enthusiasm was not diminished by the fact that she was the only one competing in her age group. At the age of 70, Doris completed a solo trip around the world visiting China, Inner Mongolia, Tibet, Nepal, India, Egypt, the Greek Islands, Iceland, and Greenland in thirty days. At the age of 76, she walked El Camino de Santiago across northern Spain backpacking alone for 8 days and completing 70 miles. She authored two books about these experiences: Journey of a Dream: One Woman's Travel Tale and A Passage: A Pilgrimage of Trials, Discovery and Gifts Along El Camino.

In the last year of her life, she was able to combine her lifetime love of horses and her passion for human services by volunteering with Serenity Stables, From Combat to Calm which provides equine therapy to veterans.


Insights


Insights, our non-fiction book group meets for discussion on the second Tuesday of each month.
