Presidents' Message

Dear Members and Friends, In the 1970s members of this branch supported ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). We are fortunate to live in a state that ratified it early in 1972, but still, in 2023, it has not been ratified by the three-fourths majority of the states required by the U.S. Constitution.

Today, once again, individuals and organizations across the country are working to see that women gain equality under the law by removing the time limit for ratification of the

ERA placed by the 1972 Congress. Plan to join us on the first Monday in November when we will learn more about the current work to meet that goal and how we can support it when **Laura Bagwell**, one of our newer members and a woman dedicated to doing her part to make the ERA a reality, will present the November program.

This is also a time to remember and honor the seven women who, more than 140 years ago, decided that the doors of higher education, then mostly closed to women, should be opened. They were our founders, and we have all benefitted from the work they and many other AAUW members who followed them have done to make higher education a reality for us. Now, let's work together to see that all women finally secure their place under the Constitution of the United States.

Before the November meeting, we hope to see you at Brookdale Community College on Monday, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m., for the October branch meeting. You have already received information about that meeting, but if you put it aside, we hope you'll take a second look and decide to attend this meeting. It's an opportunity to see other members in person and to meet local students and faculty who have benefitted from the work this branch has done through the years to support girls and young women pursuing educational opportunities. You'll learn more about the ways we have supported students for more than 50 years as well as understand better the financial challenges facing many students in 2023. If you can't attend in person, this program will be available via Zoom.

We think you'll feel a sense of pride when you learn about the support this branch has provided for girls and young women through the years so we can't close without noting that the funds that have paid for this support have been earned with many volunteer hours. The Used Book Sale has been raising funds for scholarships for more than 50 years, and in recent years the Annual Scholarship Luncheon has also contributed to these funds. We hope you will consider some way that you can support these fundraisers with some of your time, knowledge, and creativity. The time and efforts you volunteer will touch many lives.

Our group enables women with a good knowledge of French to maintain their fluency through language structure reviews and conversations with other members on different topics.




