Perhaps what you share will help the rest of us consider how we might make a positive difference.

Today we want to remember a woman who made a real difference, while confined to a wheelchair for all the time she was a member of this branch of AAUW. Annabelle Boehm was the mother of two sons and an educator for many years. After she retired and joined NMCB, she looked for a way that she could make a contribution to the branch even though wheelchair-bound. She valued books and learning and thought that she might be able to do something for the book sale. After learning more about it, Annabelle volunteered to take on the job of getting volunteers to staff the Saturday hours when the sale was open. Although she was never able to come to the book sale, she realized this was a job she could do at home on her computer and she did a superb job for a number of years including through the entire Pandemic. Annabelle not only staffed the book sale, she looked for ways to encourage potential customers to attend it by posting notices on local Patches and looking for other ways to get the word out.

Annabelle died suddenly this summer and when I went to tell her sons what a difference Annabelle had made in managing a portion of the book sale, they each told me how much her volunteer work for the book sale had meant to her. Her young granddaughters also relayed her love of the book sale. I shared earlier this year a favorite saying of mine, "Bloom where you are planted," and I think Annabelle epitomized that idea. She did not let the challenges of her situation keep her from finding a way that she could make a difference for others. I'm grateful for her life and contributions and for so many of you who as members of AAUW are also finding ways to support young women and girls.

On behalf of Heather Balczarek and myself, best wishes to each of you for a good Thanksgiving. We are grateful for each one of you.





At our **October Branch Meeting**, we learned about how AAUW supports higher education opportunities for women including fellowships and grants for graduate education. The following is excerpted from a recent AAUW news release:

The fellowships and grants program is a cornerstone of AAUW's commitment to easing the growing <u>burden of student debt</u>, which

disproportionately affects women, particularly women of color.

The American Association for University Women (AAUW) today announced it has awarded a record \$6.3 million to women scholars and community organizati ons. The awards were given to 285 fellows and grantees to advance educational and professional opportunities for women and girls. Annual Scholarship Program Gets an A

It was October, so our Northern Monmouth Branch had our various education outreach projects in mind, and this year our program included reports on the scholarships we sponsor, the reasons for them, and comments by three young women who have received them.

The program, held Monday afternoon October 2, at Brookdale College, was designed to address. Participating were our Brookdale liaison faculty members **Roseanne Alvarez** (who coordinated our Zoom connection for participants who could not be there in person) and **Sue Monroe**, along with the college's associate director of financial aid, Karyn Arnold.

As Sue also serves on AAUW's national committee that awards scholarships to graduate students, some of her comments were particularly pertinent. Among them was that fear of taking on debt is one of the major reasons otherwise qualified students do not pursue higher education.

Following Monroe's talk, Arnold discussed some of the student assistance programs available at Brookdale, several of which are offered by the state of New Jersey.

A highlight of the program was brief comments from three students who have received some of the scholarships our branch awards. Nidia Jiménez-Barrios, is a Brookdale graduate now completing her bachelor's degree through the college's joint program with Georgian Court University. She told us about the benefits of participating in NCCWSL (AAUW's National Conference for College Women Student Leaders), which she did this past summer.

Two of this year's scholarship winners, for the Esther Hymer award which is given to students at Monmouth University, were also able to attend: Taïphane Orange and Nicole Silva are both seniors majoring in political science and global affairs; they intend to begin graduate studies after gaining some work experience and garnering funds to further their education.

Esther Hymer, the distinguished member of our branch in whose honor this scholarship is named, was for decades a forceful advocate for women at the United Nations. These young women, all from immigrant families, represent the growing diversity of Monmouth County and thus further Hymer's efforts to foster the careers of women and advance well-being around the world.
