Ana Rosa (Anita) Damien



Ana Rosa Damien (Anita) peacefully passed away in her sleep on October 7, at the age of 95, surrounded by those she loved. She was a long-time member of the branch and the Advanced Spanish Study Group.

Born in Palma Soriano, Cuba, Anita was the daughter of Lebanese immigrants. She grew up in pre-revolutionary Cuba and was always motivated to be the leader of any group in which she participated. She attended and graduated from law school at the University of

Havana concurrently with a more infamous Cuban, Fidel Castro. She had children after graduation and postponed legal practice to raise her four children. Any consideration of returning to law was doused by the Cuban Revolution.

In 1962 her family had obtained permits to depart Cuba. Unfortunately, her husband physician Natalio was detained at the airport and unable to leave Cuba. Anita and her four children boarded a plane to Miami. She survived this experience, as a single mom with four children in a Miami refugee apartment, with the help of Americans and fellow residents. Her husband eventually escaped to begin his medical career in the US.

Anita's youngest sister Adela was living in NJ, and this is where she led her husband to continue his medical career and her family. They settled in Little Silver in 1969 and made it their permanent home.

Anita never became despondent despite many challenges in her life. She always just solved the problem and moved on. This was reflected in her ability to sacrifice her life in Cuba as Communism engulfed the island. She was ready to begin a new life with no belongings nor resources. She provided fortitude to her husband who became a successful and loved physician in Red Bank, to her children, and to her extended family. Anita was filled with energy and passion for life. She will be missed.

In October five of us enjoyed a conversation with Sarah Fishbein, a local New Jersey artist, at Monmouth Arts new gallery, *ArtSpace*, 99 Monmouth St.



The role of women and their inherent power is a constant question for Sarah Fishbein. How do women

break through the layers of repression and perceived powerlessness? Sarah's goal is to awaken women to the man-made cages that confine them and to explore the hidden strength that all women carry within. The "Perfect Brokenness" exhibit explores the multifaceted lives of women from many angles — showcasing the masks they wear, the battles they fight, the joys they cherish, and the love they fiercely believe in.

Through these painstakingly created depictions in glass, Sarah sheds light on the complexity and resilience of women, celebrating both their struggles and triumphs. After a lively discussion, we went to lunch at *Teak* on Monmouth Street.


Insights, our non-fiction book group meets for discussion on the second Tuesday of each month.




