NMCB November Branch Meeting Report "All Hands on Deck!

The ERA is Within Our Grasp"





Our Branch meeting held on November 6 was an engaging and informative session centered around the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). The meeting began with refreshments coordinated by **Judy Kramer** and **Susan Gelber**. A warm welcome from our co-presidents, and a statement from **Nancy Butler**, Public Policy Director, set the tone for an evening of discussion and action. The program was led by **Laura Bagwell** a new member of our Branch. She guided attendees through the significance of the ERA and the current state of its progress.

ERA Overview: Laura provided a comprehensive overview of the Equal Rights Amendment, detailing its history, purpose, and the journey it has taken through legislative processes over the years.

Current Status: Laura discussed recent developments, legislative efforts, and the groundswell of support for ratification.

Importance of ERA: Laura underscored the importance of the ERA in the context of



achieving gender equality. She highlighted key areas where the ERA would make a significant impact, such as employment, education, and legal rights.

The meeting concluded with a discussion of actionable next steps. Laura outlined specific ways in which AAUW members could contribute to the ongoing efforts to ratify the ERA, including contacting legislators, organizing community events, and leveraging social media for advocacy. She provided a comprehensive "Action Task List for the ERA" that we each took home.

Here are some highlighted points from the "Action Task List":

- Contact your Senators Booker and Menendez to THANK them for voting for SJ Res 4 and cosponsoring SJ Res 39!

A) <u>SJ Res 4</u>, A Joint resolution removing the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment

B) <u>SJ Res 39</u>, The ERA has been validly ratified and is enforceable as the 28th Amendment to the Constitution, and the Archivist, Colleen Shogan, must certify and publish the ERA without delay as the 28th Amendment.

- Ask NJ Assembly and Senators to ask NJ to pass a resolution to Tell Congress to Pass the ERA now.
- Call the White House and demand that more be done now to get the ERA passed. There is no time to wait, and there is no time to take the eye off the ball. Democracy demands it. The time is now.

## TALKING POINTS for postcards or when making a call:

 There is widespread common sense support for the ERA: "...a majority of Democrats and Republicans – whether they identify as feminists or not – say it is very important for women to have equal rights with men. Similarly, majorities in both partisan coalitions support adding the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution."





# PUBLIC POLICY

"All children should have equal opportunity to succeed. ... The latest findings show that Black students are more likely to attend schools staffed with law enforcement but without counselors, social workers, nurses, or school psychologists. Law enforcement in schools doesn't lead to safer schools: it leads to students with disabilities and students of color being disproportionately criminalized. Just look at the numbers:

- Black girls make up 16% of the female student population but were 39% of girls arrested in school.
- Native American girls had a school arrest rate 3.5 times that of White girls.
- Students with disabilities were arrested at a rate 2.9 times that of students without disabilities.

"Let's be clear: Disproportionately high disciplinary rates for students of color and students with disabilities constitutes discrimination. This is why AAUW supports the Counseling Not Criminalization in Schools Act."

This Act "establishes a \$5 billion grant program to invest in school districts that remove law enforcement so that schools can provide adequately trained personnel and trauma informed services to improve the learning environment for children and prohibits the use



of federal funds to support the hiring, recruitment, and placement of police officers on K-12 school campuses."

## AAUW

This Act was reintroduced in early November by Congresswoman Ayanna Pressley (D-MA-07), Senator Chris Murphy (D-CT), and Senator Cory Booker (D-NJ), and others. Among the numerous cosponsors is Bonnie Watson Coleman (D-NJ-12). The legislation is supported by many organizations, including AAUW.

TAKE ACTION: Ask your member of Congress to support federal funding for school counselors, nurses and social workers, not school-based law enforcement.
