Wendy Murphy's Passion: Independence for Women

New Jersey native Wendy Murphy found her life focus very early on. Majoring in English at Skidmore College, she minored in women's studies, and that is what started her on the right track.

After writing her senior thesis on women and independence as seen in historical literature, she participated in an internship at the NOW office in New York City. Wendy marvels at her good luck: being at NOW and in New York in 1983, at "that particular time in history" when the country was changing so rapidly was "a phenomenal opportunity," she says. And the internship turned into a paid job.

Her career in financial service, as a financial advisor to women and families, has allowed Wendy to continue in the same direction. A Certified Financial Planner, she aims to empower women to make good financial decisions, to become, or continue to be, independent. "I love what I do," Wendy says.

Wendy will be sharing some of that expertise at the April 2 meeting of the Northern Monmouth County Branch of AAUW. Talking about women and wealth, specifically about saving and investing for retirement and in retirement, she will allow plenty of time for questions and answers. Her main aim is to address whatever issues her audience wants to see addressed.

"All of this comes together," Wendy says, in a big new project: to get involved with the establishment of a National Women's History Museum in Washington, DC. It all started with a branch study group formed to study historic architecture in Monmouth County. The group went on to work on several projects, from planning house tours to focusing on the Battle of Monmouth, the largest land battle in the revolutionary war, the event that resulted in the British retreating from

When the Equal Pay Act was signed in 1963, women were making 59 cents on average for every dollar earned by men. By 2009, that figure had climbed to just 77 cents. 
Quite frankly, I am confounded by it. Where is Limbaugh's filter? Where is his reflexive sense that telling a woman she must pay for her health care by performing public sex acts is not just morally objectionable but reprehensibly wrong? This is not about mere political correctness; such extreme comments are an affront to every woman and to all people of good will. AAUW respects Limbaugh's right to disagree with Sandra Fluke's policy position, but his aggressive personal insults and unnecessary coarsening of the public debate are unacceptable. We will not allow such offensive commentary — clearly intended to paint all women with a scarlet letter for our reproductive choices — to silence us.

"As we celebrate the 40th anniversary of Title IX this year, Limbaugh's comments about Georgetown University law student Sandra Fluke are especially ironic. Title IX, which is well known for transforming educational opportunities for women and girls, is under attack because of its success. Without this groundbreaking civil rights law, women like Fluke might still be precluded even from attending law school. AAUW's members have long been the most vocal guardians of the law, defending it from concerted efforts to undermine its principles. Limbaugh's intolerant remarks about a courageous and articulate young woman show just how much we still need Title IX. It is also this kind of mean-spirited partisanship that has so many Americans disenchanted with politics."

Women Earn Less than Men at Every Educational Level: A U.S. Census Bureau report found that in every field, at every level of education, women earn less than men. This is even the case in professions typically dominated by women, such as education and the liberal



arts. Furthermore, as men and women achieve higher levels of education, the pay gap widens. According to the report, women are required to seek increasingly higher degrees if they hope to equal the pay of their less-educated male peers. AAUW has long fought to end wage discrimination and believes that equal pay for equal work is a simple matter of justice for women. AAUW supports legislation to promote pay equity.

Take Action! Raise awareness about the gender pay gap by getting involved in **Equal Pay Day** (April 17), the day women finally catch up to what men made, on average, in the previous year. [Clip and share NJ wage gap information in box on p. 8.]



White House, U.N. Develop Plan to Involve Women in Peace-Making: White House Council on Women and Girls Chair Valerie Jarrett affirmed her dedication to breaking down economic and political barriers for women and girls at home and abroad. In coordination with the U.N. Council on the Status of Women, the White House enacted a new National Action Plan for Women, Peace, and Security, under which all U.S. government personnel who serve in conflict-affected areas will be responsible for making sure that women are a part of the peace-making process. AAUW acted as an early and influential advocate of the United Nations and was accorded perma-



nent observer status in 1946. AAUW also supported and was present for the U.N. Commission on Women and Girls.

Virginia Senate Passes Anti-Choice Bill Mandating Ultrasounds: The Virginia Senate has passed a bill that would require women to undergo an external ultrasound before having an abortion. The approved measure backtracked from a previous version of the bill that would have forced women to undergo a non-medically-necessary invasive internal ultrasound. The Senate also amended the bill to exclude victims of rape and incest who have reported their cases to law enforcement. The bill will return to the Virginia House of Delegates, where it is expected to pass. Gov. Robert F. McDonnell (R) has also indicated his support for the bill. AAUW supports the right of every woman to safe, accessible, affordable, and comprehensive family planning and reproductive health services.

Public Funding for Private School Vouchers Approved in Louisiana: The Board of Elementary and Secondary Education in Louisiana approved a plan that would use public money to fund private school vouchers in New Orleans. The vouchers would provide educational opportunities for low-income students. This is the first part of a plan by

Gov. Bobby Jindal (R) to institute statewide school vouchers. AAUW stands firmly by the belief that the country should provide an excellent education for all children, not private school vouchers for a few.

Same-Sex Marriage to be Legal in Maryland:

Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley (D) signed into law a bill that legalizes same-sex marriage in his state. The law will take effect in 2013. Maryland is the eighth state to legalize same-sex marriage (joining Connecticut, Iowa, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Vermont, and Washington, as well as the District of Columbia) and the fourth state assembly to approve same-sex marriage in the past year, although New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie (R) vetoed the measure. Opponents in Maryland have begun to collect signatures to try to appeal the measure in November. AAUW firmly believes that no American should be denied the full range of civil rights and civil liberties due to sexual orientation or gender identity.

House Passes Bill to Rescind Higher Education

Regulations: The House of Representatives voted to pass a bill that would repeal Department of Education regulations that set a common definition for credit hours and ensure that colleges adhere to state laws. Since its founding in 1881, AAUW has been committed to making the dream of higher education a reality for women.

Partisan ESEA Bills Move Forward; More States

Apply for Waivers: Two bills that would amend and reauthorize the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) have moved forward in the House. Both the Student Success Act (H.R. 3989) and the Encouraging Innovation and Effective Teachers Act (H.R. 3990) would scale back the federal role in regulation of K-12 schools, a reversal from the law's most recent reauthorization, No Child Left Behind. The bills, introduced by Rep. John Kline (R-MN), passed out of the House Education and Workforce Committee on a party-line vote. AAUW believes that quality public education is the foundation of a democratic society. Unfortunately, H.R. 3989 and H.R. 3990 fall woefully short of providing meaningful accountability standards and risk rolling back the clock on important civil rights gains in public education. AAUW supports an ESEA reauthorization that would introduce needed flexibility while retaining a commitment to high standards and greater accountability in our nation's public schools. AAUW's congressional testi-

mony outlines many of the problems we see with the current law.

Bill to Restrict Contraceptive Coverage Stopped in

Senate: The Senate voted to table an amendment that would have allowed employers to deny coverage of health services, including birth control, based on their own personal objections. Sen. Olympia Snowe (R-ME), who just announced that she will retire from the Senate, was the only Republican who voted against the amendment by Sen. Roy Blunt (R-MO). Three Democratic senators, Bob Casey (PA), Ben Nelson (NE), and Joe Manchin (WV), voted for the amendment. AAUW has long believed that politicians should not insert themselves into the reproductive health care decision-making process and supports the right of every woman to access safe and comprehensive reproductive health services. AAUW and The Coalition to Protect Women's Health Care oppose any measure that attempts to restrict or limit the regulation on preventive care services and contraceptive coverage.

the South. Eventually **Dr. Mary Anne Anderl** carried on the work of that group by writing *The Battle Mouth: A Young Woman Goes to War*, first published in 1994. A committee consisting of Wendy, Mary Anne, **Barbara Williamson, Harriet Moore, and Isabel Kupilik** is carrying on from the original study group.

Wendy's involvement started right after she joined AAUW, when Barbara Williamson handed her a copy of the book and asked for her feedback. Wendy was impressed and felt that, although the

NJ Wage Gap Facts

In New Jersey, on average, a woman working full-time is paid \$44,166 per year, while a man working full-time is paid \$57,738 per year. This creates a wage gap of \$13,572 between full-time working men and women in the state.

As a group, full-time working women in New Jersey lose approximately **\$15,781,630,040** each year due to the wage gap. If it were eliminated, NJ's working women and their families would have enough money for:

- 101 more weeks of food;
- 6 more months of mortgage and utilities payments;
- 12 more months of rent;
- 4 more years of family health insurance premiums; or
- More than 4,000 additional gallons of gas.

The women of NJ are increasingly responsible for the economic security of their families and cannot afford to face discrimination and lower wages:

- Nearly 60% of working mothers in NJ bring in more than 25% of their families' income, and 413,308 households in NJ are headed by women.
- 21% of women-headed households in NJ live below the poverty level.

Nationally, in 2009 women working full-time, year-round were paid only 77 cents for every dollar paid to men. African-American women were paid only 61 cents and Latinas only 52 cents.

In the 112th Congress, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Paycheck Fairness Act, but it fell just two votes short in a key procedural vote in the Senate. Congress should consider this bill again.

book was written for adults, it could easily be used in schools when students are learning New Jersey history. The book was reprinted about six years ago, and **Harriet Moore** prepared a teacher's guide to make it easy to incorporate the book into schools' curricula. The committee is currently working on getting the book more widely known and into more elementary schools. Mary Anne will be talking about it at the statewide AAUW meeting in April.

The National Women's History Museum project got a huge boost when Wendy, her attention caught by a picture of Meryl Streep on the cover of *Vogue*, read Ms. Streep's article about the effort to bring to fruition the plans for that museum, to be built on or near the Mall in Washington. As she read the piece, Wendy found herself more and more excited about its relevance to the branch project. Ms. Streep, now the national spokesperson for the planned museum, explains the need for such a museum: because "our history was written by the other team."

"For instance . . . we are taught about Benedict Arnold, the first traitor in America, but I've never heard—until I went on the museum Web site—about Deborah Sampson, the first woman to take a bullet for her nation." Disguised as a man, Deborah fought in the Revolutionary War; the men she fought with assumed she was just a boy. At 17, she was cut with a British sabre across her forehead, and she took a musket ball in her thigh while fighting near Tarrytown. She treated her own wound to avoid detection. Ms. Streep found it ironic that she hadn't learned about Deborah until she was 60, when she should have heard about her in 4th grade.


And so Wendy and her committee took it upon themselves to write a letter to *Vogue*, a letter that will be published in the April issue. "Imagine our delight," since we have a book designed to educate women about just that historical phenomenon when they are in 4th grade, Wendy says with her usual enthusiasm.

And now the committee has a clear focus. Wendy brought the project to the AAUW-NJ board, and she was appointed to the board. The next step will be to join the efforts of AAUW's national board. A road trip to DC is in the works for the future.

A lot of hard work lies ahead, starting with meeting with NJ congress members to get them to sign the bill to found the museum. But hard work does not frighten Wendy! She is eager to move ahead.

If you would like to join the effort, let Wendy know. "We need to get that museum built," Wendy concludes, "and then our book will be housed on its shelves one day."


